For Parish Faith-Sharing Groups

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This toolkit provides practical guidance for starting and sustaining Ignatian parish faith-sharing groups. It is meant for parish leaders, facilitators, and anyone who wishes to create spaces where parishioners can pray, share, and accompany one another in the journey of faith.

■ 1. How to Start a Parish Faith-Sharing Group

- Begin with prayer: Ask the Holy Spirit to guide this new initiative.
- Gather interested parishioners: Invite small numbers (6-10 people) for effective sharing.
- Choose a regular time and place: Weekly or bi-weekly meetings, in homes or parish spaces.
- Use a simple structure: Opening prayer, Gospel reading, silent reflection, faith-sharing, closing prayer.
- Build gradually: Start small, let the group grow organically.

■ 2. Roles of Facilitators

- The facilitator's role is not to teach, but to create a safe and prayerful environment.
- Key responsibilities:
- Welcome participants warmly.
- Guide the flow of the meeting.
- Keep focus on prayer and faith-sharing, not debate.
- Ensure everyone has a chance to speak.
- Respect the agreed time frame.
- Rotate facilitation among members to build ownership.

■ 3. Tips for Listening & Prayerful Conversation

- Listen with reverence hear not only the words but the heart behind them.
- Use 'I' statements share personal experience, not advice or judgment.
- Allow silence pauses create space for God's voice.
- Confidentiality is essential what is shared in the group stays in the group.
- Affirm contributions thank people for their sharing.

4. Sample Group Covenant

As members of this faith-sharing group, we commit ourselves to:

- Pray together regularly.
- Listen with respect and reverence.
- Share from personal experience, not from judgment.
- Respect confidentiality what is shared here stays here.
- Support one another in prayer and in daily life.
- Allow God's Spirit to guide our journey together.
